Towards this end, I would like to express my sincere appreciation to senior management, advisors and staff in Head Office, and, specifically, to you Principals as professional leaders in our schools with your teachers, school committees and the community at large.

I have observed with keen interest the increased level of collaboration between schools and their communities and across different sectors of the economy. While this growth in community-partnerships is positive, I would like to ask that this partnership commitment be given clear direction and purpose to ensure the provision of quality learning opportunities at all times, because this is the premise upon which our Education Master Plan is based.

489 students from 7 Accredited schools. Based on these results, and in comparison with the New Zealand Overall success rate at levels 1, 2 and 3, they have been very encouraging.

- Level 1 61.5% 49.8%
- Level 2 64.2% 70.1%
- Level 3 52.5% 60.0%

## Curriculum Advisory Support for Niua School

The recruit of Cook Islands graduate teachers from New Zealand for 2009 was not as successful as for 2008. However, we have now built up the Ministry's data-base which should help in future.

I would like to make a request of Principals to review the number of school 'fund-raisers' for this year. The proper keeping of PTA Funds in some schools also need improved monitoring.

Only 7 Principals of schools on Rarotonga have submitted their Annual Reports for 2008.

This document is a requirement which should have already been submitted to the Ministry. If you have not submitted your report, I would appreciate your giving attention to this important document.

The lack of progress made so far, on the construction of the new MoE Administration is a matter of some concern. The responsibility for advancing this project has now been transferred from the CIIC to Planning and Infrastructure, who will liaise with MoE and AMD

I suggest that during this year, the Education Sector as a whole will need to remain focused on teaching and learning. Indeed, I have been encouraged by the initiatives already taken by several schools to remain disciplined and focused on the educational needs of our students. We all need to be more proactive and recognize the resources within our schools, within our parents and within the wider community.

If your school have not already done so, I would like to ask that these principals may like to consider the possibility of holding at least one (1) meeting with your staff during the year, to discuss the Code of Ethics of the Teaching Profession.

Another possible initiative, again if you have not already done so, would be to start sending 2, 3, 4 or 6 newsletters to parents and caregivers in your respective communities.

Parents, caregivers and other stakeholders are more likely to play a more active role in the affairs of your schools when they are kept informed.

Congratulations to the 7 schools which have kept staff in the Ministry updated on programs and activities in your school communities via your newsletters.

The Ministry is also interested in the recommendations from the Principals sub-committee which was elected by principals at their meeting at Papaaroa School last year. I am confident that your recommendations, when you have confirmed them, will contribute and give support for the enhancement and professional development of our Principals in Schools.

On that note and once again, I would like to commend Principals and teachers for the many contributions that you made during 2008. The progress made and the achievements accomplished last year would not have been possible without your sustained effort.

This year, we can all look forward to many more new challenges, not only within the four walls of our classrooms with our students, but also in our effort to build bridges with parents and other stakeholders in many communities throughout our small country.

Staff in the Head Office of our Ministry, join me in wishing you all the strength, energy and resourcefulness to achieve bigger goals in 2009.
